SHEOAKS SUPER FOR GARDEN and FAUNA

It's an impressive backyard buddy with super powers to lend you a hand around your house.

Fauna friend: The helpful Sheoak, (main picture), has the ability to attract all sorts of wildlife including the stunning glossy black cockatoo (right).

From helping you out in the garden, to looking after local wildlife, this common superhero can do it all and it's called the casuarina, or more commonly the Sheoak.

"Super powers possessed by the Sheoak are virtually endless," said Susanna Bradshaw who is CEO of the Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife.

"One of their powers is this plant's ability to feed a range of animals, from endangered birds, to furry mammals and even caterpillars.

"The roots of the Sheoak are a gardener's best friend because they contain bacteria that convert nitrogen in the air into nitrate for the soil.

"This is like the ultimate plant food.

"Sheoak needles help sustain native animals and livestock and they make great mulch which suppresses weed growth," said Ms Bradshaw.

There are, however, some tips for living with Sheoaks:

- Don't plant these trees too close to your nice lawn as their needles may smother the grass. Since lawn doesn't support many plants or animals, see if you can convert some areas into garden beds instead, where Sheoaks will be happy to grow and provide free mulch.
- If you plant Sheoaks in a row, they can make an excellent windbreak for your garden.
- Remember that these trees are very fast growers so don't expect them to stay small for long.

Ms Bradshaw said gardeners shouldn't be fooled by the changing nature of Sheoaks.

Police Point is a hidden treasure on the Peninsula. It is a 17 hectare bushland reserve in Portsea abutting Point Nepean National Park, comprising of Coastal Moonah Woodland.

For the past 6 years the Shire has been implementing a substantial ecological restoration project helping to improve the depleted vegetation and protecting the population and habitat of the long-nosed bandicoots, white footed dunnarts and the many other critters that call this reserve home.

An enormous amount of work was achieved at the first working bee in September, so it has been decided to hold more.
